



# Different Techniques That Show Bias

#### **Bias Through Selection or Omission**



Choosing to use or not to use a specific news item. Within a given story, some details can be ignored, and others included, to give readers or viewers a different opinion about the events reported.

#### **Bias Through Placement**



Readers of papers judge first page stories to be more significant than those buried in the back, while news websites place the most important stories on their home page.

Where a story is placed, therefore, influences what a reader or viewer thinks about its importance.

#### **Bias Through Headline**

Many people read only the headlines of a news item.

Headlines can present bias and prejudices. They can convey excitement where little exists.

They can express approval or condemnation.



#### **Bias Through Word Choice and Tone**




The use of words with a positive or negative connotation can strongly influence the reader or viewer: consider how a hockey game might be seen differently if it's described as a "loss," a "close game" or a "near-win."


Or the terms "illegal alien" vs "undocumented immigrant"

#### **Bias Through Statistics**


Numbers lie all the time.
Compare "More than 900 people attended the event" with "Fewer than 1,000 people showed up at the event."




