"Phineas Priest" [sic] is a unique concept within Christian Identity. Phineas Priests believe they have been called to be "God's Holy Warriors" for the white race. The term "Phineas Priest" is derived from the Biblical story of Phinehas (Book of Numbers, Chapter 25), which adherents interpret as justifying the killing of interracial couples.

But many Americans wouldn't attribute this violence purely to Christianity. Why?

My Answer:

Many Americans know lots of Christians who aren't violent - so the evidence doesn't match the theory.

Not as many Americans know lots of Muslims. So the theory is challenged less often.

Before We Go Into This:

There are ~1.8 billion Muslims.

We are going to be talking about a very specific set.

- 1978 Communist revolution in Afghanistan
- *1979 Soviets provide support & troops for Communists.
- Jihadists (Mujahideen) fight back (w/ US support -Operation Cyclone)
- *1989 Jihadists push Russia out. Many of them go on to form Al-Qaeda. Osama Bin Laden is named their leader.

Al-Qaeda



Al-Qaeda members are from many different branches of Islam. There's no central agreed upon doctrine or denomination.

In 1998, Al-Qaeda issued a fatwa that said: ""We -- with God's help -- call on every Muslim who believes in God and wishes to be rewarded to comply with God's order to kill the Americans and plunder their money wherever and whenever they find it. We also call on Muslim ulema, leaders, youths, and soldiers to launch the raid on Satan's U.S. troops and the devil's supporters allying with them, and to displace those who are behind them so that they may learn a lesson."

1998 - Fatwa



Fatwa - nonbinding legal opinion on an important topic

Stated Reasons for the 9/11 Attacks

"The expansion of Israel is one of the greatest crimes, and you are the leaders of its criminals. And of course there is no need to explain and prove the degree of American support for Israel. The creation of Israel is a crime which must be erased. Each and every person whose hands have become polluted in the contribution towards this crime must pay its price, and pay for it heavily."

Iraq & Kuwait



"despite the great devastation inflicted on the Iraqi people by the crusader-Zionist alliance. and despite the huge number of those killed, which has exceeded 1 million ... despite all this, the Americans are once against trying to repeat the horrific massacres, as though they are not content with the protracted blockade imposed after the ferocious war or the fragmentation and devastation. ... On that basis, and in compliance with Allah's order, we issue the following fatwa to all Muslims: The ruling to kill the Americans and their allies—civilians and military is an individual duty for every Muslim ..."

Iraq & Kuwait



"for over seven years the United States has been occupying the lands of Islam in the holiest of places, the Arabian Peninsula, plundering its riches, dictating to its rulers, humiliating its people, terrorizing its neighbors, and turning its bases in the Peninsula into a spearhead through which to fight the neighboring Muslim peoples."

In a later interview, bin Laden said that Americans were too near to Mecca, and that should be considered a provocation to the entire Muslim world.

The Riz Test

A test developed to measure how Muslims are portrayed on TV



If the film/show stars at least one character who is identifiably Muslim (by ethnicity, language or clothing) - is the character...

- Talking about, the victim of, or the perpetrator of terrorism?
- Presented as irrationally angry?
- Presented as superstitious, culturally backwards or antimodern?
- Presented as a threat to a Western way of life?
- If the character is male, is he presented as misogynistic? or if female, is she presented as oppressed by her male counterparts?

If the answer for any of the above is Yes, then the Film/ TV Show fails the test.

Some More Facts About the Case (from CNN)

Balbir's killer, Frank Roque, told the police: "I'm a patriot and American. I'm American. I'm a damn American."

Balbir considered himself a patriot, too. An hour before he died, he had driven to a nearby Costco to purchase plants for new landscaping at the gas station. On his way out of the store, he emptied his wallet, donating \$74 to the 9/11 victims' fund. Then he called Rana and asked him to bring a few American flags to display.
